

Here are Lee Rose's directions for the Gretchen Border. This border will complete the pattern that was printed in the last newsletter.

Gretchen Border

Border

Using the 24 pieces of 66" #2RR, hairpin a piece around a spoke from the outside of the basket to the inside, going under two rows of the triple wale. (See picture). Pull the #2 RR to the inside with the ends even. Now repeat the hairpin step around the each spoke alternating "dyed and natural" until all spokes have been hairpinned

Complete a locking row. Lay the basket on its side and start anywhere with a spoke and weave behind one spoke and out (toward the top). End in the same pattern and then tighten down this row before going on.

Tighten each row after you finish and before going on to the next row.

Mary Sorrell's, also recommends the Gretchen Border instructions in a book she has called BRAIDED BOR-DER BASKETS, by Genie Jackson.

July 12 Meeting - 10:00 am at the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum, OKC

As Mary mentioned in her letter, we will make our Positive Tomorrows baskets at the July meeting. You can bring weaving materials sufficient to make the basket of your choice. Basket size should be somewhere between 8 and 10 inches diameter. Or you can bring some 1/2 inch flat and 1/4 inch flat oval, 1/2 inch flat oval for rim and some seagrass and I'll bring a pattern you can use.
